2) Discuss potential project ideas

- a) See attached list, updated for today's meeting
- b) Project ideas discussed at the last meeting include:
 - i) Town record digitization. The town has received a quote of ~\$67,000 to digitize all of the land records which includes anything bound in the leather/blue/green books in the Town Office (titles, deed, easements, etc.). This quote does not include digitization of zoning files but an updated quote can be requested. There is currently ~\$60,000 in the records restoration reserve which can fund this project although should not be entirely depleted as this reserve is also used to purchase storage and restore old records as needed.
 - ii) Town website, email, and cybersecurity upgrades. Annie is working with Henry to put a cost estimate together for this project. It may help to have another Town staff / volunteer who is up to date on technology upgrades assist with this project.
 - iii) Treasurer/Grant Administrator position. Annie & Christine presented this idea to the Selectboard at their meeting on September 12th and they were supportive of this approach. The numbers as presented to the Board are as follows:
 - iv) The tables below summarize what is currently budgeted for the Treasurer position in the FY23 budget (25.5 hours/week at \$27.58/hour) and the potential total cost of increasing the job to 40 hours at the same rate, and 40 hours at \$30.00/hour (this would become the high end of the potential hiring range).

3) Review draft project intake form and discuss process

a) Updated draft intake form attached with updates as discussed at 9/7 and sent to me since last meeting.

4) Review and consider project prioritization rubric

a) The CVRPC template project prioritization rubric is attached as well as the recommendations for project prioritization provided by VLCT and reviewed at the 8/24 ARPA Committee meeting. The committee also discussed using (1) housing/infrastructure, (2) child care, (3) transportation/recreation, and (4) government services as the four main priority "buckets" at their last meeting.

5) Update on ARPA project administration

a) The committee has been looking for an update on the process anticipated for issuing the ARPA funds once initial allocation determinations have been made. One of the primary questions was whether we'd need a separate agreement with each entity that we allocate funds to. Katie Buckly with VLCT responded saying, "If the Town is giving funds to another entity to complete a specific body or work or task, then best practice is that you would create a simple agreement or memo of understanding (MOU) but it is not a requirement of the funding." It would be best to develop a simple agreement/contract for these projects ensuring funds are spent adequately and coming up with a system to determine any procurement processes that may need to be established and assurance that the entity has the capacity to manage the funds and report back to the Town as necessary.

I. Call To Order

The meeting was called to order at 5:00 pm by Ms. Decker-Dell'Isola. The meeting was held in person at the Waitsfield Town Offices and remotely via Zoom.

II. Regular Business.

1. Agenda additions, removals, or adjustments per 1 V.S.A. § 312 (d) (3) (A)

No modifications were made to the agenda.

2. Review and approve minutes

The minutes of August 24, 2022 were approved.

3. Review list of projects submitted through the Town website to date

Fourteen suggestions had been received; Committee members reviewed this list, evaluating whether the proposal appeared to fit into the parameters of allowed ARPA expenditures, what other funding might be available for the type of work outlined, and what the long-term impacts would be in terms of ongoing expenses and transformational effects. Some questions arose around costs and existing infrastructure and several projects had general support from committee members for further review once more specific proposals are outlined. It was decided that this follow-up will take place:

- Chris Badger (Energy Coordinator) will be consulted regarding current Town solar electricity production.
- Some transportation-related proposals may be reviewed in coordination with the Mad River Path.
- Any support for housing will require a preliminary discussion regarding eligibility of ARPA funding for specific project/programs
- Community wastewater solution proposals may also seek funding from other ARPA and non-ARPA avenues.
- Annie will compile information regarding the costs associated with increasing cybersecurity and digitizing land records.
- Christine raised the possibility of temporarily funding an increase of the vacant Treasurer position to include Grant Administrator duties and become a full-time position.

4. Discuss overall project goals and prioritization

It was agreed that childcare is a potential area for prioritization; NOW has already indicated their intent to submit a project proposal, Spring Hill and Waitsfield Child Care Center will be contacted to determine if they have any interest in participating.

Housing is another area likely to be focused on; the Housing Coalition will be asked if they have ideas regarding possible ways to make transformational use of these funds.

Other priority areas agreed upon were infrastructure, transportation, and town (government) services.

5. Review draft project intake form and discuss process

Annie provided a draft of an intake form for committee review; the group was generally in approval of the document, but with some ideas for requesting more detail regarding the description of the proposal. Members will offer suggestions for any edits to the draft, and the form will be finalized, along with an accompanying proposal evaluation rubric, at the next meeting.

Due dates will also be set for receipt of proposals; Annie will share the evaluation rubric designed by CVRPC, and she will also post a request for general ideas once more on FPF.

6. Updates on ARPA project administration

Annie indicated that she had reached out to VLCT regarding clarification of the Town's responsibilities regarding administration of approved projects, and is awaiting a response.

7. Other Business

Suggestions were offered for potential additional members. The committee can consider requesting the Selectboard amend the requirements for residency to serve on the committee if necessary. Annie will post the 2 vacancies again with another post to FPF regarding the open survey.

8. Adjournment

The meeting adjourned at 6:18 pm.
